Summary: Inspired by the Sesquicentennial (150th) celebration, we'd like to acknowledge the pioneers who helped to build Boulder County. For the purposes of this project, we are only interested in collecting the names of people who were here prior to Colorado's statehood which occurred on 1 Aug 1876.

Definitions: *Early Pioneers* - Those Native Americans, explorers, trappers and traders who were in the area prior to 1858. Gold Rush Pioneers - Those who came to the area between 29 Nov 1858 (the arrival of the Nebraska Party in Boulder) and 28 Feb 1861 when Colorado became a Territory.

Territorial Pioneers - Those who came to the area after Colorado became a Territory on 28 Feb 1861 but before it became a state on 1 Aug 1876. www.facebook.com/Boulder.Pioneers.Project

Lessons Learned

Consider the same logistical questions for researching your family that you would when researching a community Look for all of the types of records that could have information on your family Research all government offices that your ancestor may have interacted with Revisit records you gathered records in the past, that you would gather differently in the digital age Revisit "burned" counties and ask about the records that do exist Check the parent and child counties of the county you are researching Consider accounts written at the same time and place as your ancestor lived Look at the county histories written at the same time as your ancestor lived there Revisit the big genealogical databases often to check for new material Look for databases of new material you have not previously researched
